



This solid brick home is one of several on Elm St known collectively as Pullentown. Richard Stanhope Pullen, who donated the land for what is now NC State, built them for family members between 1880 and 1890.



The renowned, pick-of-the-litter, 0.34 acre lot features a paver stone lined garden that was the site of many receptions for Miss North Carolina contestants, hosted by earlier owners who were contest officials.



Elegant indoor receptions, past and present, are part also of its history. The open floor plan is enhanced by the center hall which was opened to the gourmet kitchen when it was remodeled in 2011.



The 15x14 ft, west facing living and dining rooms each feature double doors opening onto the front porch, 6 over 6 windows and handsome decorative fireplaces.



The living room shown here could be part of an in-law suite that includes the 13x13 ft adjoining room listed as a 4th bedroom, most recently used as a den/family room.



This 4th bedroom/den/family room could become a 1st floor master suite with the removal of a false wall hiding a door to a recently remodeled full bath at the back of the house.



The gourmet kitchen, new in 2011, features solid surface counters, pantry, gas range and other new appliances.



Versatile flex space - breakfast, rec, play room - is provided by a recently remodeled, earlier addition that overlooks the back yard and opens onto the big back deck.



Future expansion options include adding a sun room overlooking the back yard. See pictures below of the partially finished, daylight, lower level that opens to a patio area under the deck.
